Some thoughts from The Slow Moving World of the Child:

The world everywhere, invariably, moves too fast for children to comprehend.

Adults move too fast for children to be able to imitate them successfully. Yet our children try their very best, regardless of our pace. The world of the child is slower than that of an adult because the child is not yet coordinated and their logical thinking skills are not fully developed.

When a child moves only as fast as they can actually navigate, there is no more tripping over their own feet. Spills are kept to a minimum. They begin to notice and observe their surroundings with heightened awareness. They have time to behave out of conscious choice, rather than simple stimulus and response.

This means going VERY SLOWLY and it takes an almost monumental effort on the part of the adult because nothing in society will support them.

However, unless one supports this slower paced environment, one will never know the world of a child.
